Mineral Rights in Montana

The board has received questions concerning the mineral rights held by RRESMRC in Montana. There has been some confusion about this issue. Several directors and interested parties thought that ESMRC would have a revenue stream when there was drilling on the property.

The board had hoped there would be drilling on the property and some income would be realized when drilling was completed, but this has not occurred.

The following information has been prepared by the board to help clarify this issue.

December 2010 update on the Montana minerals owned by RRESMRC (clarified):

- The RRESMC (Home) has an approximate 12.5 percent mineral interest in 3,865 acres in Montana. This interest is shared with several other Masonic organizations.

- It is mineral rights only, not land.
- The previous lease was on 310 acres for five years. The lease was granted with a bonus of about \$1,500.
- Drilling has not occurred, and the lease expired in January without any additional revenues.

The board received an offer in October to purchase the mineral rights for about \$10,000, retaining a small royalty interest. The board rejected this offer because, although it was thought that this offer reflects the current fair market value of the property, it is hoped that the value of this asset will increase with increases in energy prices and additional requirements for offset drilling activities in the future.

It is hoped that this will clear up any misconception concerning these mineral rights. The board, as part of its fiduciary responsibility, will review any options that are brought to the board and hopes there will be a small amount of income in the future.

Building Rehab for Robert Russell ESMRC

As we roll into the New Year, I would like to update everyone on the progress of the cosmetic renovations occurring at the Eastern Star Masonic Retirement Community. I hope many of you have had an opportunity to come by the Home and take a look at the new carpeting and interior painting that has been done. In addition, new snack stations have been installed to invite residents to enjoy a snack or beverage whenever they choose. The residents are thrilled with the changes. 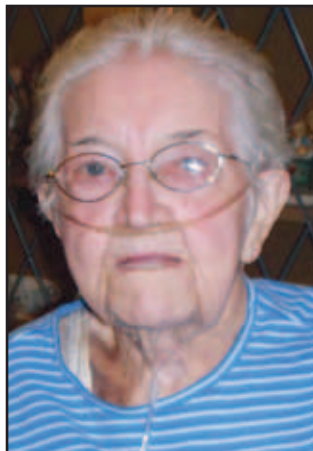
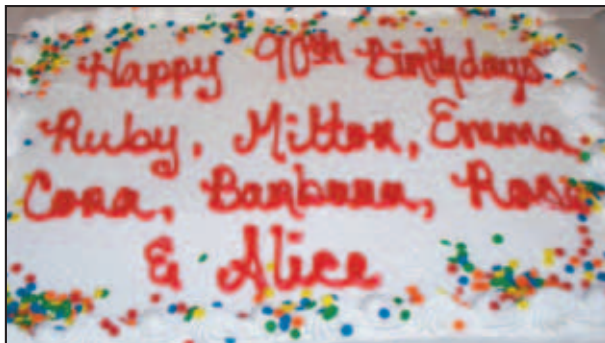
Spotlight on Residents

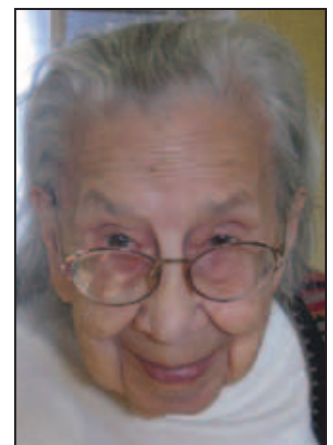
